Americans described Brisbane's ONE GOES OUT WHERE MILLIONS CAME pressive.

"Our people could not have asked for more." said the officer in charge of the U.S. War Graves unit visiting Queensland, Captain J. B. Harris.

"The simple but sincere tri-bute by Brisbane crowds along the route of the cortege was very touching to me as an American," the American Consul (Mr. W. L. Peck) said.

"I was particularly impressed with the solemn atmosphere and silence of the crowds as they waited for the cortege to pass," he said.

Crowds In Square

Greatest congregation during the funeral was in King George Square, where between 5000 and 5000 saw the casket handed over by American to Australian officers. Preceded by a mounted police escort the casket was taken to Newstead Wharf, to be placed on the Goucher Victory.

Three R.A.A.F. bombers flew low over the route of the procession.
