Dear Joan and Bill:

Many thanks for your good newsy letter. It was interesting to note that you had been back to the States and that your enjoyable trip was coupled with good weather.

As you no doubt already know, we, here in the Midwest, have had one of the worst winter seasons on record and were very glad to have April come around. Now we are having almost daily rains and storms with accompanying flooding and land slides. The snow was super abundant this past winter and broke the all-time record in many areas. The cold was the worst but I managed to keep indoors much of the time. I really did not suffer from the cold this past winter.

This past week the vegetable and flower gardens were planted - very small - but something that has always been enjoyable. Our tourist season is now upon us with the opening of the fishing on May 1. The balance of the fishing season opens this Saturday. In addition to that, one of our local clothing merchants sponsors an annual 17 kilometer race and that will be this coming Saturday. Even though the race is small by most standards, he has had it for so many years that it now has some TV coverage from Minneapolis. He also has had many of the names frequently taking part in other big national and international races. Dick Beardsley, the runner-up in Boston this year, was the winner here a year ago. Mr. Carlyle has insisted that I take some 35mm slides for him. A few others are doing the same besides motion pictures and video tapes.

Your information about Wacol was most interesting. I do not recall, exactly, the number of buildings included in our section, but I know that each Company (B & C) each had two buildings, the Officers had one, then there was one each for the Mess Hall, Medics, Headquarters, Headquarters Detachment, Motor Pool personnel and the Latrine with outdoor showers and lavatories. The barracks occupied by the part of "B" company of which I was quartered, was the easternmost building of the group. The Headquarters building was abount in the middle with the Medical Building the farthest to the west. The Officers Quarters were the closest to the fence and railroad line. The whole area was bush and with tall grass and a few ant hills. We were not permitted to trim any of the bushes or grass. Our small drill and training area was down near the railroad tracks. Our hikes were done along the road past the station and into the woods. A couple of times we were taken to the Australian rifle range for some target shooting. At that time there was quite a space between our unit and the OCS buildings. Those buildings were closer to the road and entrance. We did not have a gate at that time and usually no guards were stationed there. Our guards were on the road as one entered the 738th area. A tent was set up at that point. The Supply sections for each company and headquarters and Battalion were in tents and scattered in various places within the limits of our camp area. We had no movie equipment so we were invited over to the OCS section to see theirs when they were able to get them. Since our location at Camp Columbia was only temporary, we were not permitted to put up anything of a permanent nature. We were moved to Camp Whinstanes a few days before Christmas when those buildings were finally completed. The accompanying sketch is what I remember of the location of areas and buildings at Columbia.

When we were transported to Australia in July of 1942, another MP Battalion was also on the ship, namely, 720th. They were quartered in the ballroom of the Mount Vernon and we were on the same deck but around the perimeter of the promenade (enclosed by windows). The latest edition of the American Legion Magazine notes that the 720th is having a reunion this June. This is the first I have heard anything about them since arriving in Australia. I have often wondered where they were stationed and how they were distributed around the Pacific theater. Yesterday I wrote to the organizer of the reunion and asked if he might fill me in with some information. If not, I will have to look elsewhere. Our two Battalions were the only army personnel on board, the rest were Naval units to set up the hospital in Wellington and the nucleus of the 5th Air Force which was headquartered in Brisbane. The ship was full of officers and hardly any enlisted men. Howver, we had a might good trip across the Pacific with 3 good meals each day.

Strange as it may seem, I am contemplating a return visit to Australia this fall in September or October. If tour arrangements can be made satisfactorily to include the New Guinea cruise for the 40th anniversary of the arrival in US troops there in 1942, I may swing down and include Townsville and Brisbane and maybe take in some of the Commonwealth Games. Plans are tentative and difficulty with the New Guinea Cruise is holding things up at present. My former tour agency of last year has finally gotten some concrete information and is trying to work things out for me. I am also competing with calls from my cousin in Norway to come over there and not go to Australia again. This cousin lives near Oslo and those from my Mother's side live up the field from Bergen.


There are two other anniversary reunions this year for me. One is my High School class and that will probably be our last big one as so many are passing away these past few years. The other one is my Mother's family reunion near Moorhead, Minnesota. This is an annual affair and not everyone goes every year so there is the opportunity to meet different cousins each year. Both of these are in August.

A local couple has a married daughter who is teaching in Melbourne and they are expecting Barbara and her family to come for a visit in December. I had Barbara as a student one quarter at the University and I visited her when I was in Melbourne. At that time I was also entertained by the Graham Godden family near Melbourne. He is a ham radio operator of whom I spoke when visiting with you. He and his wife are planning to come to our town sometime later this year. He was here two years ago with his family. Since he works for an airline, he is financially able to make these trips. It will be very nice to see these people again.

I have enjoyed your letters and especially my visit with you last year. Thank you both for such a wonderful attention to me, a stranger.

Camp Columbia as I remember it from august 1942 To secenter 1942



I have some information on Camp Columbia. The camp was built in late 1942 and the first U.S. Unit to be stationed there, was th 738th Military Police Battalion. I have enclosed a photo copy of the first building that was built at the camp.

The 738th moved into the camp in August 1942 and lived in tents. The unit remained there until 24 December 1942 and at that time, they moved to Camp Whinstanes on corner of College Ave. and Kingsford-Smith Drive, Eagle Farm.

During December 1942, the camp was hastly being expanded and buildings being erected by the Civil Construction Corps, under the gidance of the U.S. Army Base Section 3, Engineers. The first class to attend the Officers Candidate School began on 3 January 1943 and this class graduated on 1 April 1943. The school was discontinued in May 1945, after VE-Day. The camp was turned over to the Australian Army, after the Americans left in late 1945.

The 42nd General Hospital at Stuartholm, establised a Section III at Goodna Mental Hospital on I September 1942 to care for the mentally distrubed patients. During July 1942, Section II of the 42nd had been established at Camp Columbia, in the area North-West of the present camp area and across Ipswich Road. This was a convalescent camp with tents for the patients and a few buildings for recreation, kitchen and headquarters. Section II remained here until October 1943, when they moved to the new hospital built at Holland Park.

The Australian Archives here in Brisbane, have a large recond book that containes information and plans on the construction of U.S. Military Installations in Queensland. It was prepaired by the U.S. Army Engineers. I have seen this book and it has a lot of blueprints on the projects. At the time I was looking for information on the camp built at Rockhampton and did not notice if the book included Camp Columbia.

There was also a Camp Freeman off Freeman Road in the Darra-Inala district. This was a U.S. Army transport and ammunition dump. There was a Negro Ordance unit stationed there. If you have access to a book "History of Our Inala and Suburbs", by Mrs. G.J. Riley, it containes a lot of information about this area.

I recently had a phone call from a Bob McHugh, 6 Yarraga Ave., Carrole Park, Q. 4300, phone No. 225-4328 and he is reserching infomation on the Carrole Park area, during WW II and is interested in information on Camp Columbia, Wacol and Goodna areas.

I attended OCS at Camp Columbia for three months, begining in September 1944, so I am familiar with the area. Several of the buildings at the present camp are just as they were in 1944. We were quartered in tent rows that extended from the row of mess halls, down to Bullock Head Creek. There was an obsticale course down along the creek and this I will never forget.

738" GUARDS ALLIED AND JAPANESE ENVOYS

Once again our battalion, the 738th was called upon to handle a very difficult task, one which was probably the most important job in the history of our organization. On August 17th, 1945, at 1300 hrs, Companies 'A', 'C', and 'D' were relieved of all regular military police duties in the City of Manila and assigned to the sole, important duty of guarding and escorting the high ranking Allied and Japanese officials who were to gather here in Manila for the Presurrender Conferences called by the Supreme Allied Commander, General of the Armies Douglas MacArthur. Included in the list of Allied dignitaries, whose safe-keeping was our responsibility, were high ranking officials from England, China, Russia and the Netherlands, while the Japanese delegation consisted of the ranking officers in their army, navy and airforce along with their civilian advisors.

BATTALION HISTORY Part 4

On 4 February 1945, the battalion prepared to move into Manila, a forward echelon; reached the City on 5 February with the rest of the troops arriving at the Manila Jockey Club on 6 February, On the morning of 7 Feb., details were sent to patrol main thoroughfares heeping them open for military traffic. prevent looting, guard Santo Towns and Bilibid prison. Enemy artillary X 1988 and mortars scored direct hits on assess Tomas and Bilibid, wounding several Bat and killing some citizens. Truckloads of tires, motor parts, jewelry, personal, public and government property were confiscated and several million pesos in paper, coin and bullion that had been looted from banks by civilians were recovered. Groups of EM directed by officers were also sent out into the Tondo factory district to repel infiltration by the Japs who swam or were transported across the Pasig River, while other men were called out to combat snipers in various buildings downtown. On 11 Feb. just as most of the personnel were at chow, enemy artillery from the south struck the area around and in the Jockey Club many times. One shell landed in front of the race course, another fell at the main gate of the track, another (Continued Page 4)



hard and long to make the event go off without a hitch, but to this writer, it was one of the biggest events to hit this war-weary world in many a moon, and well worth the effort spent.


The Japanese arrived early Sunday evening, August 19th, and after a brief introductory ceremony at the airport were immediately escorted to their billets by Co. 'D'. That night they went into conference and naturally the 738th. was there to keep the old 'Eagle Eye' on them. Finally on Monday, they were whisked away to the airport for their return trip to Japan. There they boarded the plane, and our duties as far as the Japs were concerned, were past history.

The entire assignment was exceptionally well handled and the officers and men of the battalion all displayed excellent training and a fine devotion to duty. In the words of a famous general (whose name escapes me at the moment) "A job well done."

hit a truck in the motor pool, then one landed in the field and finally one crashed through the roof of the main stadium into Company C orderly room, kitchen and quarters. Seven casualties were sustained from that burst: the Battalion Commander and 4 EM were killed instantly, 2 EM were seriously wounded and evacuated, and many were slightly wounded. Some officers and EM remained at the scene to remove the dead and wounded, administer first aid and guarded equipment while the rest of the troops moved to the Balintawak Brewery. The battalion was still attached to the Sixth Army and Company D was ordered to San Fernando to police the town and surrounding territory. Northern Manila was divided into three zones, each of the three remaining companies accepting full responsibility in these zones for treffic, looting, enemy infiltration, guarding of vital installations. The period from 5 February to about 24 March was a chaotic one. The operations section of the battalion worked long hours and produced magnificently. Motor and foot patrols were established on certain routes, guards were placed in a man tude of places, etc. Many times, just a short notice the entire descent had to be changed to take care of your duties which arose due to emergencies. HISTORY BATTALION

In this week's issue of the "BLOTTER" we bring you the second installment of the Battalion history. In last week's issue, we followed the Battalion through its activation to Australia, and then to New Guinea; in today's article we pick up their work in New Guinea Three fourths of the Bn. arrived at Oro Bay on 15 December 1943 and was informed by Col. it until it was assimilated by the New Guinea Detention and Rehabilitation Center. Companies B and D moved to, Finschafen, arriving there on 15 March 1944, and immediately performed the following duties: Set up a complete system and operated a base stockade for garrison and general prisoners; traffic control and patrol, and guarded base installations such as QM depots, finance office, APO, docks and bridges. At this time a detachment of EM was placed on DS with the Australian 5th Division Provost Corps for traffic and convoy work from Sattelberg up to Madang. Prisoners of war were escorted by boat and plane to points in New Guinea and Australia. A ship completely filled with Indonesians and American missionaries rescued from the Japs at Aitape and Hollandia was escorted to Brisbane. Cargo guards were supplied for ships carrying general army supplies and special naval navigation instruments to Biak, New Britain, Hollandia and Aitape. Personnel were also placed on TD with various offices such as the Base TJA, AG Personnel, AG Publications, Base Claims Office, PM Office and Base Engineers.

On 25 September 1944 this battalion was attached to Sixth Army effective 17 September. Hq. Det., Med. Det. and Companies A and C left for Hollandia from Oro Bay and Companies B and D left from Finschafen to stage for the Leyte operation. The entire move from Oro Bay and Finschafen to Leyte was made in only 18 days, during which time the battalion had to be fully equipped and trained.

The Battalion embarked for Leyte on 13 October. Companies A and C. Med. Det. and one half of Hq. Det. boarded ISTs 171 and 452, landing on Red Beach, Leyte, on D-Day, 20 October, LSTs 171 and 452 and one other boat landed farthest south on the east coast of Leyte; no other ships landed below them. MP troops were the first troops ashore on the anchor end of Red Beach, landing there before the infantry at 1115 hours. There were no troops to their left or south flank and none ahead (Continued Page 4 Col 2)



(Con't from page 1 col 1) Just as the troops were ready to debark, both LSTs were struck with several direct hits from a Jap 75 millimeter artillery piece on shore. LST 452 began to burn and 2 EM of Company A were killed instantly. On IST 171, a total of 9 EM in Company C were killed instantly: the 1st Sgt., several non-coms, and some privates. One EM is still missing and 16 were seriously wounded and evacuated to Hollandia. After the first echelon reached shore, they immediately assisted in unloading operations. directed troops and vehicles and administered first aid. About 200 yards from shore, just east of a marsh and directly behind our 75 mm. artillery line, a perimeter defense for one section of Red Beach was established and maintained from 20 October to 25 October. 





SEND YOUR VOICE HOME

The Public Relations section of the Military Police Command has instituted a vast new program whereby members of the command may be brought in closer contact with their families, wives, and friends back home.

Foremost in this campaign is a plan whereby the men may make recordings of their own voices, and have them sent home. On or about the 15th of July the M.P.C. will send a recording machine and mike out to our Battalion. The man will be grouped according to localistic and transcriptions made of them There will be from four to sight wat an a record according to the Length of the individual conversations. These recordings will then, after being censored, be sent back to the local radio stations in the States. When these stations are able to fit the recordings into their programs they will notify the families or wives of the men concerned as to the exact time and on what day the transcriptions will be broadcast. This ought to please the folks back home a great deal; anyway they will know that you are at least strong enough to talk over a microphone. 





In this week's edition of the 'BLOTTER' we bring you the third installment of the Battalion history. In last week's edition we followed the battalion up to, and including the landing of Companies A and C on Red Beach, Leyte, which took place on October 20th 1944.... Companies B and D and the remaining half of Head-quarters arrived at Red Beach on D plus 2, 22 October. On that date, reconnaissance patrols were sent inland to check a bridge and road junction captured from the Japs the day before. While on this mission, the patrols encountered heavy sniper fire. Personnel of Company A procured material for, and built the first POW stockade on Leyte and continued its operation until 5 December 1944. Part of Company B was sent to White Beach and operated from the Beachmaster's Office. Their duties were directing traffic, guarding vital dumps, and convoying newly arrived troops inland. During


an air raid, an enemy bomber struck a gas dump on White Beach and the exploding gas and fire destroyed all the men's clothing, weapons, equipment and stoves. The EM assisted engineers to put out the fire, directed traffic and saved other vital sup-

plies stored nearby. Company C moved into Palo, operated the MP station, directed traffic and guarded several bridges, including the large Palo bridge. Company D continued to guard 6th Army Headquarters and General Krueger's quarters, then did regular MP duty in Tanauan. Personnel of Company B convoyed infantry troops to the Burauen air-strip area during the landings

of the Japanese paratroops and convoyed ration and ammunition trucks to the front lines when Negro truckers refused because the route was under enemy artillery fire. Another group of men guarded General Mac-Arthur's headquarters at Tacloban.

During the first two weeks on Leyte, all duties were performed under constant enemy ari attacks, in complete blackout and under most adverse weather conditions. As many as 52 air attacks were experienced during a 24-hour period.

Company D arrived at White Beach, Lingayen Gulf on D plus 1, 10 January 1945, and moved into San Fabian with Sixth Army Headquarters under enemy artillery fire. Company B, Med. Det. and Hq. Det. waded in at Blue Beach, Lingayen Gulf on 11 Jan. 1945. Companies were assigned duties in a net running from Dagupan to Urdaneta, to Tarlac, to Camiling and back to Dagupan. A detachment of D company moved into Urdaneta on the very afternoon of the big tank battle. Burning Japanese tanks bordered the roads and were located in town. Specific duties were operating police stations at Dagupan and Calasiao, directing (Con't page 4 col. 1)

traffic, motor patrol guarding bridges and the roads between the above-mentioned towns. At 2400 hours on 19 Jan, 1945, while 5 EM of Company D were guarding a bridge on the San Fabian-San Jacinto Road, the men encountered a Jap patrol whose mission was to destroy some U.S. artillery batteries beyond the bridge. Two men heard a shuffling noise in the brush, called 'Halt' three times and then opened fire. The Japs returned the fire and had set up at least one machine gun and were tossing grenades. These men were in a cross fire between the Japs and guards from a hospital unit on the other side of the enemy. At daybreak, a check revealed 4 enemy dead a few yards from the MP's which were credited to them and it is likely that four more Japs a few yards away were also killed by the MP's. The Jap machinegun was captured and it was discovered that one of the Japs was an officer. The action of these men was most decisive in disorganizing what up until that time was an organized Jap patrol....

We had a whole day of visiting. It was a most journes celebration. He had married and has now a young son. I also met many of his relatives and friends. This was the highlight of the new Luinea trip. a few days later we stopped at Dregerhaven and Finschhafen for a whole day. This was the area where we were stationed for 9 months in 1944. What great changes have taken place. Hawever, the village still uses the original water system the army installed in 1944. The old swimming hale is still being used much as we IT's did. Our camp area is nowa banana plantation, We were somewhat involved in the riot disturbances in the highlands

region. On one tour we had a police escort in front, 3 riders in the bies with us and 9 more in a nehicle behind us for a wholeday. nothing happened but there were police searcher along the highway at different places. It seems that there were prison escapees, a couple murders and lots of robberies in the area besides rioters burning cars and teres in towns. The neft day, the regular tours were not permitted to take place as the police were needed everywhere. We were held back from leaving Port Moresby for a lay and a half so I last some time in Cairns on my return. Thank you for the most on Joyable and restful day at the Club. Hitava Island is part of the Trobriand Groupand the people seem to be more able to cope with the outside world. The men do make excellent pilots of ships and as navigators. My hope is to make another trip to see that family.

On that first trip an acquaintance was made with a Major Tracey Rowen, an Australian trainer of the island's military force. He has since moved to Sydney and we correspond frequently.




Our invasion landings on Leyte and Luzen have been some of our other achievements - honored by the U.S. as well as the Philippine President.



We have a couple of guys living here how were in the 814th MPs, but they don't remember too much about this incident.

I was back in Ore on in Aug. & Sept. 8h for five weeks and attended the 41st Div. Reunion in Portland and also attended a Bentson reunion in my old home town of Silverton, OR. Joan was back in Portland, OR for a few weeks in 8h also and had a good visit with her friends. We both can't be away at the same time, due to the business we have. We hope to sell the business this year, so we can get back to OR for three or four months together and will also travel around the States.

I still keep busy on my ham radio and this keeps me up on the news from back home. Talke to a lot of hams around the States. My ham friends in OR can but me through on the telephone to my friends and relatives.

In June, there was a reunion of parts of our old 738th MP unit here in Wisconsin. The turnout was not as large as we had hoped but it was successful. At that time, I contacted two individuals who were present or who participated in the "Battle of Brisbane". One was a Corporal of the Guard on the detail that night and he is going to tape his recollections of the event and send the tape to me. The other person was not on duty at the time but was involved in the call for reinforcements. When I get the reports from both of them, I will send them on to you for your information and possible addition to the writing that you are doing on that incident. I would like to receive from you the copy of the report of the "official" summary of the events. I do have a copy somewhere from the Courier Mail that was rewritten in 1981. It will be interesting to see your final story of the happening.

A friend of mine left this morning for Melbourne and I longed to go there with him. Maybe I can arrange another visit next year in October or November. It would be most pleasant to make another visit to Papua New Guinea. THOUGHT IT WAS ABOUT TIME TO WRITE YOU AND THANK YOU FOR THE XMAS CARD FROM LAST YEAR. BETTER LATE THAN NEVER.

JOAN AND I RETURNED ON 26 NOVEMBER 93 FROM A ROUND THE WORLD TRIP.

WE WERE AWAY FOR 77 DAYS ON THE ROAD. HAWAII, SAN FRANCISCO, OREGON,

WHERE WE ATTENDED MY SALEM HIGH SCHOOL CLASS OF '38 REUNION AND HAD A

GREAT TIME. THEN ON TO WASHINGTON, D.C., NEW YORK CITY, WEST POINT,

WHERE VISITED THE GRAVE OF A GOOD FRIEND, WHO WAS KILLED IN KOREA. THEN

ON TO ENGLAND, NORWAY, SPAIN, BANGKOK, SINGAPORE, THEN HOME.

SPENT TWO WEEKS IN NORWAY, WHEN WE LOCATED THE AREA AND THE FARM MY ANCESTORS LIVED ON FOR SEVERAL GENERATIONS. A FRIEND IN OSLO HAD RESEARCHED MY FAMILY RECORDS AND WAS ABLE TO FIND WHERE THE BENTSONS CAME FROM. IT WAS A GREAT EXPERIENCE TO WALK AROUND THE FARM, WHERE MY ANCESTOR ONE TROD. PART OF THE HOUSE AND THE SMOKE HOUSE HAVE BEEN PRESERVED AND THE ARE THE SAME AS WHEN MY ANCESTORS LIVED THERE. OUR GRANDPARENTS NEVER DID TELL US WHERE THEY HAD COME FROM IN NORWAY, SO IT TOOK SOME SURCHING TO FIND THE AREA. I AM THE ONLY ONE WHO HAS BEEN TO NORWAY AND FOUND OUT ABOUT THE FAMILY. THEY CAME TO THE STATES IN 1866 AND MY GRANDFATHER WAS AGED 18 AND THE OLDEST OF SEVEN CHILDREN MAKING THE TRIP. MY GRANDFATHER WAS BORN ON THE FARM IN 1848.

WE SPENT MOST OF OUR TIME IN SOUTHERN ENGLAND, STAYING WITH A FRIEND IN FARNBOROUGH. FROM THERE WE TOOK TRIPS AROUND THE COUNTRY. HAD TWO DAYS IN LONDON, VISITED WINCHESTER, CHITCHESTER, READING, GILDFORD, SOUTHHAMPTON, FARNHAM, ETC.

THE FRIEND WE STAYED WITH IN FARNBOROUGH, HAS A UNIT ON THE COSTA DEL SOL, ON THE MEDITERRANEAN, SO SHE TOOK US DOWN THERE FOR A WEEK.

WE ARE GETTING ITCHY FEET AGAIN TO MAKE ANOTHER TRIP. JOAN WANTS TO GO DOWN TO TASMANIA, SO WE MAY GO DOWN THERE FOR A COUPLE OF WEEKS, THIS YEAR. WE DO WANT TO GO BACK TO NORWAY FOR ANOTHER VISIT. AFTER WE GOT BACK HOME, I FOUND OUT, THAT I HAVE SOME DISTANT COUSINS LIVING IN THE AREA, NEAR THE BENTSON FARM WE VISITED. THERE ARE TWO FAMILIES ON THE MATERNAL SIDE, THAT I HAVE LOCATED.

BRISBANE IS GETTING READY FOR CELEBRATIONS FROM NOW, UNTIL AUGUST OF NEXT YEARS FOR THE REMEMBERANCE OF THE 50th ANNIVERSARY OF THE END OF WW II. THEY HAVE A LOT OF EVENTS PLANNED.

NOT MUCH FURTHER TO REPORT. I DID RECEIVE THE ENCLOSED LETTER AND THOUGHT I'D SEND YOU A COPY, SINCE IT REFERES TO MILITARY POLICE.








